NEW! Salish Fusion Knitwear (Brentwood, BC)

Salish Fusion Knitwear is owned by the Olsen family, based in the traditional territory of the WSANEC (Saanich) People in Brentwood Bay, on Vancouver Island.

All work is performed by Vancouver Island knitters who are highly valued, fairly paid, and profit from the venture. The company values the unique and original, continuing in the steps of those before them who innovated to preserve wool-working culture.

The wool used is from Vancouver Island and is natural in its form and colour. Wool is carded and spun to produce a beautiful thick wool with natural water repellency. Felting turns casual knitwear into fashion, traditional design into graphic design, and knitting into textile art.

NEW! Tokaya (St-Jérôme, QC)

It was during a trip to Mexico that the idea for Tokaya came to its two founders, Karine Provost and Karine Lemelin, the idea of creating ecologically sound clothes for women. Tokaya's pieces can be worn in a multitude of ways and the collection includes maternity wear and accessories.

Tokaya clothes are made with the organic fiber, bamboo. Besides being natural, bamboo fabric is more absorbent than cotton and the fibers have antibacterial properties. The cultivation of bamboo requires no fertilizers nor pesticides, while the water supply needed for the plant is very low. Its production is respectful of the environment.

Based in Whistler, a large part of Dihedral Design's philosophy comes from life in the mountains. If you're going to make something inspired by the wilds of British Columbia, it had better be able to survive them.

Eventually she went full circle: "I finally journeyed back into my past and picked up that first item that I learned to tailor, the beautiful bag made from vintage upholstery fabric that had my grandma's cameo pin as a closure button on the front."

Mary Helen uses vintage bark cloth, lace, and buttons to create her bags, the scenes influenced in part by her hometown outside of Regina.

She also makes pillows, soft bulky scarves, purses, vests, head bands, and wrist warmers as part of her product line. Avi gets her unspun wool as much as possible from local, Western Canadian sheep.

The hours and days of Tania's childhood spent in her aunt's studio doing batik and tie dye and watching her dad hand cut designs and screen print contributed to her current artistic practice.

Rapt by nature, she has recently developed a collection of scarves that are carefully hand-screen printed and dyed with plant-based inks and dyes that she makes in small batches giving priority to nuance and variation.

Tania forages locally for many of the plants she uses such as black walnut, sumac, and goldenrod.

Harvesting plants at different points in the season also offers differences in the pigment concentration.

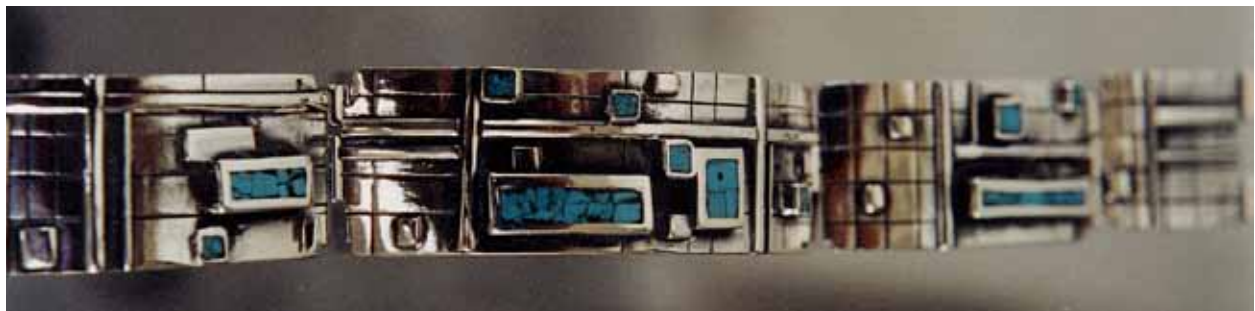


NEW! Murat Senemoglu (New Westminster, BC)

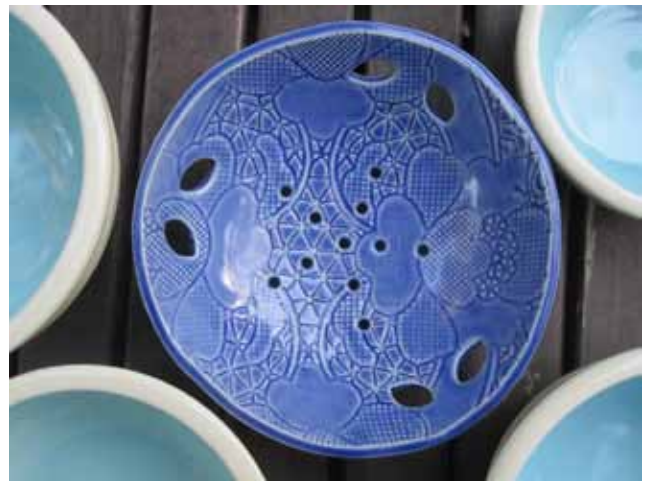

She graduated from the Studio Art program at Capilano University in 2004, then transferred to Emily Carr to complete her visual arts degree and graduated in 2006. This is where she met her best friend and ceramics partner in crime, Melissa Hume. They have shared several studios together, had many shows, and been active members of the Vancouver market scene. NEW! Sandpiper Studio (Windermere, BC)

Sandpiper Studio is a small scale production and design studio specializing in functional handblown glass. Their intent is to carry forward traditional glass making techniques with modern aesthetics and design sensibilities to produce meaningful and functional objects that resonate in everyday life.

In addition to using traditional glass blowing techniques to create their pieces, they also hand screen print glass enamels to make their own decals. Once the screen printed decals are made, they are applied to the glass forms and then refired in a kiln. This process allows Sandpiper Studio to achieve printed imagery and patterns that are permanently fused to the glass surface.
